Top Gun 2003

A report by Bill Swindells.

Again this year a member of our club, George Bartkus, was invited to attend and compete in this prestigious event held yearly in Florida, by Mr. Frank Tiano. The event sends invitations to approximately 60 to 70 pilots from around the world to come together at one location, for a competition of craftsmanship and skill in not only building, but also flying. Contestants are marked on the actual scale resemblance of their chosen aircraft, which includes outline, colouring, markings, and interior details

of cockpit, exterior features such as rivets, hatches, latches and fabric coverings.

The event was held this year from April 24th to 27th at the Lakeland Airport. This location is at the west end of the airport property and provides a paved taxiway for runway



surface as well as a parallel grass surface for those preferring the turf.

Set up of shelters and sunshade tents starts on the Tuesday, with sponsors and other fliers beginning to arrive on the Wednesday. Static judging commenced on Wednesday, with the flight lineup being posted on the Friday for the first of the four rounds of flying to start bright and early Saturday morning, continuing on into Sunday.

George, along with his wife Lynne in one van, lovingly nursed his beautifully finished FW-190-F8 to the site. Peter Masefield and I attended in a second van with the practise aircraft.

After traveling about 2000 Kms (1200 miles), the aircraft was ready for static judging, and received a static score of 86.917. This is quite good considering the detail that is required for the judges, and the correctness that is needed to be even close to the presented documentation.

The judging of the aircraft is accomplished by a minimum of three judges, each looking for the exact requirements as provided in the documents. Shape, outline, colouring, and details for external views as well as, colours, details and exactness for internal cockpit views are judged. All are inspected very carefully, with the one judge whose specialty is detail, examining the aircraft from as close as 15 cms (that's 6 inches for you non-metric types). Although much of the

judging is based upon actual facts and outlines, etc., some of it, in my opinion, is also subjective, such as colour matching etc. where outside light may tend to shift the colour spectrum slightly if filtered through a sunshade. Obviously the judges do not like to sit under the hot sun all day judging aircraft.

Once the static judging is done for all aircraft the flight schedules are posted for the commencement of the scale flying to start bright and early Saturday morning.

George, unfortunately, did not complete his first flight. Due to a severe cross wind on the paved runway, he over-corrected the steering on his takeoff roll, and the sheer forces fractured the top of the metal landing gear leg at the retract mechanism, thus eliminating any further attempts, as this was not field repairable.

George was not the only one to experience problems. Any-

thing as small as a scraped belly due to collapsed landing gear, or a fuselage parting from the wings, about 300 feet in the air was experienced with total loss as impact was directly on the paved runway!

During the Saturday noon time air show, the attrition rate was horrendous, of 11 WW II aircraft airborne, only six landed, the remainder 'impacted' with terra firma in one form or another. In all fairness, this was an exciting and exhilarating experience to watch these aircraft chasing after each other with the tolls mounting.

The event included aircraft from all eras of aviation, from the WW I biplanes, to the Golden Era of flying, WW II, single and multiple engine airframes, and post WW II.

Talk about realism for sight, sound and smell. Have a look at the current generation of turbine-driven aircraft. Even in a strong cross wind, they flew like they were, to use a cliché, on rails.

This was an exciting and truly educational event, and an opportunity to meet some of the most experienced builders from around the world. You notice that I did not write best fliers, as some of these builders do not fly very well at all, but they sure can build.

We were away for a total of eleven days, which involved four days of travel during that time. This great experience was enhanced by the love of the hobby by many of these skilled and talented builders and fliers, and it gave me an opportunity to actu-

> ally meet in person some of the pilots that I have conversed with via E-mail, or visited during the Toledo Show.

If you ever have the time and opportunity to attend Top Gun, I would highly recommend that you do. Make sure that you obtain a Pit Pass, for without this, you

do not get the chance to see many of these fabulous models up close to see the detail, and talk to the pilots and builders.
