Those Pesky Model Airplanes

In the last few months there have been a number of issues brought to my attention regarding the club rules and the application of same. One note that has just arisen is Rule #4. "No aircraft shall exceed a noise level of 85 db at 7 meters."

The club has a relatively accurate sound meter that is used to test noisy aircraft. However this rule is a little subjective, yes a meter reading of more than 85 db is against the rules, but common sense is used in applying this rule. If an aircraft sounds very loud it will be tested, if it is above 85 db and it is possible to quiet it down, the pilot will be asked to try and achieve the 85 db or close to it. How can we do that? The easiest way is to slow down the prop. But how do you do that? Put a bigger one on, or a different make. Some makes of props are noisier than others. Another option is using a different muffler, yep it's gonna cost you, but if that's the only way then that's how you do it. Prop and muffle for sensible sound levels.

If you need some advice there are numerous web forums on all sorts of RC stuff and this is one such subject. A loud airplane is not necessarily a fast or attractive airplane.

Field managers have access to the sound meter so if you want a voluntary test done just ask one of them to do it for you. You won't be grounded right off the bat but you will be expected to be within limits on your next visit to the field. Pilots who ignore the rule will be asked to stop flying, and continuing to ignore the rule will result in a permanent grounding.

Remember, under certain weather conditions the sound from our planes can travel a long way i.e. into Tyundaga. If the city receives too many complaints we will lose our field.

P.S. by the time you read this the revised rules and field diagram will be posted at Bayview. Please take the time to review them.
